Hebrews 2.14 - 18

¹⁴ Since, therefore, the children share flesh and blood, he himself likewise shared the same things, so that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, ¹⁵ and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by the fear of death. ¹⁶ For it is clear that he did not come to help angels, but the descendants of Abraham. ¹⁷ Therefore he had to become like his brothers and sisters in every respect, so that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. ¹⁸ Because he himself was tested by what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.

Luke 2.22 - 40

- When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.
- Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. ²⁶ It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. ²⁷ Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, ²⁸ Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,
- ²⁹ 'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word;
- for my eyes have seen your salvation,
- which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples,
- a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.

³³ And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. ³⁴ Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed ³⁵ so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

³⁶ There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage, ³⁷ then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. ³⁸ At that moment she came and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

³⁹ When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. ⁴⁰ The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

Reflection by Rural Dean, Rev Priscilla Slusar

Today we celebrate Candlemas or the Presentation of Christ in the Temple. The title of this special feast day in the church is revealing. It's called Candlemas because it's a feast of light; a reminder that Jesus came into the world to bring light and hope to a world of darkness. The promise of God's love and the hope of eternal life stands alongside the dark reality of the world. The alternative title for today tells us about the event that we are remembering – the presentation of Christ in the Temple. It's significant that the name Christ is used rather than Jesus. The name Christ tells us that this is the Saviour, the Messiah, long awaited by the Jews. Jesus is the Saviour is for all people not just the Jews.

A couple of years ago I read an article in the Church Times about the medieval customs practised at the feast of Candlemas. There would have been an elaborate procession to represent the journey of Mary and Joseph to the Temple in Jerusalem. Every person would carry a candle and offer it to the priest with a penny. The candles were

blessed and left in the church to burn throughout the night. The parishioners also brought other candles to the church to be blessed. These were taken home and lit in the house when there was a thunderstorm or when someone was ill. The candle represented hope and blessing in times of darkness or fear. These shades of light and darkness are reflected in the gospel story.

It's a family story; Jesus' parents taking him to the Temple in accordance with the religious laws – the joyful parents bringing their new child to the Temple to give thanks to God for a safe birth. Simeon and Anna, two elderly people who serve in the Temple, join in with the prayers and celebration; like doting grandparents.

The Jews had waited for so long for their Saviour that Luke was bound to write about it as a great celebration; a time of joyful praise. Simeon is an old man. He has received a promise from God that he would see the Messiah before he dies. He has waited and waited; he has become elderly and frail; he has practically given up hope. Then Mary and Joseph bring their baby son into the Temple, a very ordinary occurrence. A family giving thanks for their son. Simeon sees the wonder of God reflected in this baby; he recognises Jesus as the Messiah. We would expect him to give a great shout of thanks and praise to God! He prays beautiful words to God, acknowledging that it is now time for him to die because God has fulfilled his promise to him. "Now, Lord, you let your servant depart in peace, according to your word" – the canticle that we refer to as the Nunc Dimittis

But the story of the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple is not just a cosy family story or just a celebration of praise. There is also a reminder of harsh reality. It is a bitter-sweet event. The joy is tinged with foreboding. Simeon foretells the difficulties that lie ahead. He tells Mary and Joseph that Jesus will face opposition; he indicates that there will be suffering and death – and suffering for Mary as well. The wonder of the presence of God's only son in the Temple is tempered by the harsh reality of the world.

Then the story moves again from darkness to light; from sorrow to joy. Simeon reminds us that Jesus will bring salvation to all nations not

just to the people of Israel. The light of Jesus will spread throughout the world.

And this is where the prophetess Anna plays a role. She is also an elderly person who has waited patiently for news of the saviour. She spends her days in the temple in prayer and service. When she arrives on the scene she also recognises Jesus as the Messiah and she spreads the good news of his birth to everyone she meets. She becomes one of the first evangelists, spreading the gospel throughout the city.

What message can we take from this story for our present day lives? Simeon recognised the wonder of God's presence. He saw God in a baby boy. Do we recognise the wonder of God's presence in our ordinary lives? Are we alert to the wonder of God's creation? Are we aware of God in our encounters with other people, in our daily relationships with our family and friends? Are we open to the wonder of God's presence in the hymns and prayers of our worship? It's too easy to take things for granted and miss the wonder of God in our ordinary lives.

There is another serious message for us from today's gospel. Gospel means good news – and Simeon reminds us that God is with us even when life is dark. This is the good news of the gospel. When God became a human being he accepted that role of sharing our suffering. Jesus knew the pain of torture and death; Mary and Joseph understood the pain of suffering. Even when we face suffering, depression, illness or bereavement, God is with us – standing by us, sharing our suffering. The pain is still there, the suffering is still present – that is the harsh reality of our lives – but we know that God is sharing that suffering and supports us with his presence.

The feast of Candlemas is a reminder that Jesus brought the light of hope into a dark world. Candlemas teaches us that the wonder of God is present in our lives and that the light of God's presence gives us hope in a dark world. As we light candles today we pray that all who see that outward and visible light would remember and be blessed by the inner light of Christ 'who lightens everyone who comes into the world.'

I'm going to finish with a prayer for the blessing of the candles:

"Lord God, the springing source of everlasting light, pour into the hearts of your faithful people the brilliance of your eternal splendour, that we, who by the kindling of these flames light up this temple to your glory, may have the darkness of our souls dispelled, and so be counted worthy to stand before you in that eternal city where you live and reign, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever." Amen
